Elementary school students across San Benito County were challenged by the San Benito County Office of Education to read 3 million words over the summer. Together they surpassed their goal reading 6,451,127 words, equating to 18,338 books.

The summer reading challenge was part of the Building Bridges 2 Literacy initiative launched in May. Partnering with Footsteps2Brilliance, Inc., the county-wide English and Spanish early literacy initiative allows families, who reside within the county, to access an array of interactive, fun and engaging e-books, games, and activities with the goal that all students will be able to read at a proficient level by the third grade.

"Literacy is arguably the most crucial factor in determining whether a student will succeed in school and beyond. If we can intervene at an early age, then our students will have a solid foundation to attain their college and career goals," County Superintendent of Schools Krystal Lomanto told BenitoLink.
